Pupil Premium Statement

Pupil premium funding is given to schools to support eligible groups of children. Grove House Infant and Nursery School receives £1,320 for each child who is entitled to receive Free School Meals or who has been entitled to receive them over the last six years. We are required to publish online our pupil premium strategy.

Our aim is to provide experiences to enable all children to be independent and confident learners. We want our pupil premium children to achieve equal progress to other children with similar starting points.

In-School Barriers To Attainment For Pupils Eligible For Pupil Premium:

A.	Prior attainment - many children come into school with low levels of attainment for reading, writing and maths. This is a significant barrier to accessing the curriculum.
B.	Motor skills - many children come into school with poor motor skills. This is a significant barrier to their writing.
C.	Family involvement - lack of school involvement by families can be a significant barrier to a child's learning.
D.	Attendance - some of our pupil premium children have below average attendance.

External Barriers To Attainment For Pupils Eligible For Pupil Premium:

E. Safeguarding concerns - often learning and emotional well-being are affected.
